

New Property Tax Payment Method

The Borough of Haworth offers an ACH Bank Draft Program (direct withdrawal) for our taxpayers. This service assures that your payment will be received in a timely manner and provides a safe and secure way to pay your property taxes without the worry of mail delivery or the need to come to Borough Hall to pay in person.

Quarterly property tax payments as billed will be debited from your CHECKING ACCOUNT on the payment due dates of Feb 1, May 1, Aug 1, and Nov 1. We cannot draft from savings or equity accounts. You may enroll or cancel at any time, provided a completed authorization form is received at least **TWO WEEKS** prior to the scheduled draft date.

If you would like to enroll in this program, please complete the ACH Direct Withdrawal Form included in this newsletter. Please be sure to complete the entire Authorization Form, attach a VOID personal check and bring or send to:

Incomplete applications will delay your enrollment.

Property Tax Reimbursement (also known as the Senior Freeze):

The deadline for filing 2015 applications has been extended to October 17, 2016. If you did NOT receive a PTR application (light blue booklet) or want to ask questions: 1-800-882-6597.

Homestead Benefit:

This program provides property tax relief to eligible homeowners. To qualify, you must meet all the eligibility requirements. The Division of Taxation mailed applications for the 2014 (Yes! 2014) homestead benefit in mid-September. If you previously filed online and indicated that you wanted to receive your application electronically, the State sent you an email containing instructions for downloading the application packet. Most homeowners file their applications either online or by phone. The filing deadline for 2014 Homestead Benefit Applications is November 30, 2016.

Senior & Veteran Tax Deduction Programs (\$250 per year):

The **SENIOR** deduction has both a minimum age and a maximum income requirement (\$10,000 after a permitted exclusion of Soc Sec Benefits, **OR** a Federal, State, County, or Municipal Govt Retirement /Disability Pension).

The **VETERAN'S** (or Widow of a Veteran) deduction requires duty during specific wartime periods, a copy of DD214 showing Honorable Discharge and home ownership since Oct 1st of the pre-tax year.

If you feel you may be eligible for either program, application forms are available from the Tax Collector. If approved, the deductions take effect in 2017. If you are already receiving either of these deductions, you do not need to apply again. This is for NEW applicants only.

New Homeowners: Welcome to Haworth! If you did not receive a copy of your tax bill at closing from the previous owner, please call the tax office (201) 384-0450 x21. By statute, it is the homeowner's responsibility to ascertain the amount and due dates of property taxes, but we need to hear from you in order to answer your questions. Thank you.



DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works has cleaned many of the Borough lots of the debris, overgrowth, limbs and dead trees that have made these areas unsightly. Inasmuch as we have worked to improve these areas, and Ordinance No. 810 prohibits dumping on public property, and calls for fines of \$250.00 to \$500.00, we would ask you to please not dump in these areas. Also, if you see someone dumping, PLEASE call the police immediately. This will save Haworth residents a great deal of money and help keep Haworth looking beautiful.

PROPANE TANKS Please bring propane tanks to the Household Hazardous Waste Collections (1 lb. And 20 lb. tanks only) or contact either Modern Propane located on Route 46 West in Lodi, NJ (973) 778-0812 or Suburban Propane located on Route 17, Mahwah, NJ (201) 529-3500 for propane tank removal. HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES: Household battery manufacturers have begun manufacturing alkaline batteries with no added mercury and have reduced the amount of mercury added to other batteries. Alkaline batteries now fall below Federal and State hazardous waste standards and can be disposed of in the regular trash. Batteries that must be recycled are rechargeable batteries found in cell phones, cordless phones, cordless power tools, laptop computers, digital cameras and remote-control toys.

The label on the battery will indicate if it is rechargeable. If it says "Alkaline", dispose of it in the trash.

Rechargeable batteries can be recycled at participating retail locations including the following: Radio Shack, Best Buy, Staples, Target, Office Max, Lowes, Home Depot, Sears, Wal-Mart and Verizon Wireless. To find a retail collection site, use the collection site locator at www.call2recycle.org or call the consumer helpline at 877-2-RECYCLE.



The Haworth Volunteer Fire Department

It's time for Fire Prevention Week, and the Haworth Vol. Fire Department is joining forces with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind local residents to "Practice Your Escape Plan!" During this year's fire safety campaign, firefighters and safety advocates will be spreading the word about the importance of creating and practicing the use of a family escape plan.

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as two minutes to escape safely once the alarm sounds. Your ability to get out depends on advance warning from smoke alarms and advance planning — a home fire escape plan that everyone in your family is familiar with and has practiced.

Home Heating:

As we get approach the fall/ winter months please have your heating systems checked by a professional. Furnace and chimney fires occur every year and can be very damaging. Before you use your fireplace or wood burning stoves, have the chimneys and flues checked by a professional chimney cleaner. Animals and birds do make homes in your chimneys during the season. Cresote built up in fireplaces and wood stoves are the number one reason for chimney fires. Please have them cleaned before use.

The Great American Fire Drill

What's it all about?



Sound the alarm: it's time for the Great American Fire Drill! During Fire Prevention Week 2015, NFPA is asking kids and families all across North America to practice their home fire escape plans. Just how big will the Great American Fire Drill be? With your help, we're hoping to have the world's biggest fire drill.


- Pick a date – anytime in October.
- Make your plan.
- Practice your escape drill.

Your ability to get out depends on advance warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible exits and escape routes. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors. Also, mark the location of each smoke alarm. For easy planning, download NFPA's escape planning grid. This is a great way to get children involved in fire safety in a non-threatening way.



- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. NFPA National Fire Alarm Code requires interconnected smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Everyone in the household must understand the escape plan. When you walk through your plan, check to make sure the escape routes are clear and doors and windows can be opened easily.
- Choose an outside meeting place (i.e. neighbor's house, a light post, mailbox, or stop sign) a safe distance in front of your home where everyone can meet after they've escaped. Make sure to mark the location of the meeting place on your escape plan.
- Go outside to see if your street number is clearly visible from the road. If not, ***install house numbers*** to ensure that responding emergency personnel can find your home.
- Have everyone memorize the emergency phone number of the fire department (911). That way any member of the household can call from a neighbor's home or a cellular phone once safely outside.
- If there are infants, older adults, or family members with mobility limitations, make sure that someone is assigned to assist them in the fire drill and in the event of an emergency. Assign a backup person too, in case the designee is not home during the emergency.
- Tell guests or visitors to your home about your family's fire escape plan. When staying overnight at other people's homes, ask about their escape plan. If they don't have a plan in place, offer to help them make one. This is especially important when children are permitted to attend "sleepovers" at friends' homes. See NFPA's "Sleepover fire safety for kids" fact sheet.
- Be fully prepared for a real fire: when a smoke alarm sounds, get out immediately.
- Once you're out, stay out! Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building. If someone is missing, inform the fire department dispatcher when you call. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.



Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide Alarms Save Lives



- Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms once a month, following the manufacturer's instructions.
- Check the manufacturers date on every smoke and CO Alarm units, if they are more than 10 years old, replace them.
- All smoke detectors must be replaced every ten year.
- All CO detectors must be replaced every five to seven years.
- Hard wired systems also must be checked every year.
- Replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide alarm with new once a year. If the alarm "chirps", that is a warning that the battery is low. Check the date on the batteries before you install them.
- **Hint:** schedule battery replacements for the same day you change your clocks for daylight savings time!
- If the unit still chirps, replace it!, they are very inexpensive.

- Hard wired fire systems and CO systems have a battery backups, have the batteries checked when you are having the system checked.



Pet Waste Pollutes Our Waters

What You Can Do To Help Protect Our Water

Clean and plentiful water is important to our families, our environment, our economy and our quality of life.

Did you know that animal waste from pets can pollute our waters? When left on the ground, pet waste is washed by rain and melting snow and ice into storm drains that carry it to our rivers, lakes, the ocean and drinking water.

Animal waste contains a high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease-causing microorganisms that can cause problems.

What you can do

Pet owners or anyone who takes your pet for walks must properly dispose of the waste by picking it up, wrapping it and either placing it in the trash or flushing it unwrapped down the toilet.

Your municipality is required to adopt and enforce local pet-waste laws. At a minimum, your community must require that pet owners or their keepers **immediately and properly** dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on **any public or private property not owned or possessed by that person**. People with assistance animals such as Seeing Eye dogs are exempt.

Make sure you know what your municipality requires – and follow it.

Thank you for doing your part to keep New Jersey's waters clean.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.


As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

- Recycle used motor oil.

- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.

- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.

- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.

- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.



Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.

- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.

- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.

- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.

- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.



Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.

- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.
